# **Preliminary Notice of Race**

The Kerikeri Cruising Club invites all owners and charterers of eligible monohull and multihull boats to enter the 2017 Kerikeri to Vava'u yacht race. This race is organised and conducted by the Kerikeri Cruising Club.

The Cruising division's starting window will be weather-dependent between May 3<sup>rd</sup> and May 5<sup>th</sup> 2017. The Racing division's start will be on May 6<sup>th</sup> 2017. Start times for both divisions will be at 1400 hours. The start line will be opposite the Kerikeri Cruising Club in the Kerikeri Inlet, Bay of Islands.

The 2013-2016 Racing Rules of Sailing and associated Yachting New Zealand prescriptions and Safety Regulations of Sailing have been referred to in this document but will be superseded by the relevant World Yachting and Yachting New Zealand 2017-2020 documentation.

#### 1 Rules

This race will be governed by the rules as defined in the Racing Rules of Sailing (RRS) in force at the time of the race.

The relevant Yachting New Zealand (YNZ) Safety Regulations Part II Category 1 will apply, as will the Yachting New Zealand Prescriptions and Safety Regulations of Sailing.

The current rules of the YNZ Performance Handicap Racing Fleet (PHRF) handicapping method using the Passage tcf.

The IRC Rules in force at the time.

#### 2 Notice of Race and Sailing Instructions

The Notice of Race will be published on the race web site later this year. The Sailing Instructions will be issued at, and may be available prior to, the race briefings.

#### 3 Eligibility

The race is open to all sailing monohull and multihull boats whose owners or charterers are financial members of a club recognised by the competitor's national authority, and shall:

- Meet the requirements of YNZ Safety Requirements of Sailing Part II, Category 1.
- Have an overall length (LOA) not less than ten (10) metres.

• Be a New Zealand registered ship, or for overseas entrants an equivalent registration. Further eligibility requirements will be detailed in the Notice of Race.

#### 4 Entry

Register you interest for this race on the event web site, where the Notice of Race and Sailing Instructions will be posted in due course.

#### 5 Categories and Classes

The race will be conducted in two categories; monohull and multihull.

Multihulls will race using the Multihull Handicap system while Monohulls will race under IRC and PHRF Passage.

All Cruising Division yachts will be evaluated by the Handicap Committee and issued with a General Handicap.

#### 6 Sponsors' Prize

All owners/charterers of yachts starting in this race will be eligible for the drawn prize of a trip for two to Vava'u including return international flights ex Auckland and internal flights in Tonga, staying seven nights at the TONGAN BEACH RESORT courtesy of MONDO TRAVEL Kerikeri, REAL AIR Tonga and the TONGAN BEACH RESORT. This prize will be drawn at the race prize giving in Vava'u.

Race prizes will be advised in the Notice of Race.

# Marina Report

Despite the weather, winter is a busy time at the marina. Maintenance is a job that is best done when there are fewer boats & people around so Pete McLea & Phil Harris have been busy.

There are thousands of galvanised steel 'through-bolts' that require an annual check, tighten & grease. These are important, they hold the marina together but are almost invisible to the casual eye. Regular maintenance of these has highlighted that the bolts on the breakwater may be coming due for replacement. Some are 20 years old. The pulling & replacing of a sample is planned to further ascertain condition & as a method of calculating the overall cost if full bolt replacement is necessary.

Winter is a quiet time for the Haul Out. But....if you want a spring or pre-Christmas booking, make it now to avoid missing out.

Jim Murdoch, Phil Stocker & Dean Smith have been working towards extracting the marina from the Financial Markets Conduct Act (FMCA). It is hoped that a resolution to this end will be voted on at September's AGM of berth licence holders. However if the details of this cannot be finalised in time a special general meeting of berth licensees may be necessary. This resolution requires agreement of 75% by value of the licence holders so a military operation is being planned to obtain a result.

The July-December 2016 marina fees invoice has been sent. There was an extra line on the invoice which has raised a couple of queries. There will be more information on this with the AGM material but in brief these are the anticipated expenses involved in:

- obtaining title for the marina reclamation not previously sought & now a requirement of the new Resource Consent,
- extracting the marina from the Financial Markets Conduct Act which currently burdens the marina with unnecessary accounting & auditing costs
- review & potential change of the marina's legal structure i.e. does the marina need a Statutory Supervisor going forward or is this a structure (& cost) that is not required now that all of the construction is completed?

Visitor pool payments have been made to those licence holders who made their berths available in 2015/2016. Please if you are going away during summer, consider making your berth available to visitors by calling the office 407 9434.

# **KEELBOAT REPORT**

#### Harcourt's winter series

This series has just been concluded and it was pretty much down to the wire at the end of the ten races. Race 8 was sailed in plenty of breeze which gusted to around 30 knots during the race. Although Tongue Twister (Brian Hutching) led Learning Curve (Paul White) home by a healthy margin there was less than half a minute between them on corrected time with Tongue Twister taking both this and the PHRF honours. B Division sailed a slightly shorter course, being led home by Vim (Garry Colebrook) followed by Chiara (Ian MacGregor) with Vim winning on handicap.

Conditions for race 9 were much better with a ten knot North easterly taking A Division on a 20 miler and B on a shorter 15 miles. First home in A Division once more was Tongue Twister followed by Leaning Curve and Pete Woods' Physical Favours, with Learning Curve enjoying the lighter conditions by taking out handicap from Physical Favours and Tongue Twister. B Division's race saw Vim take line honours from That Girl (Pete Mclea) and Chiara, handicap going to That Girl from Vim and Chiara.

Race 10 has just finished. The final and deciding race in both this and the Divisional Championship series was sailed in a fresh to strong north westerly which brought Deep Throttle home first ahead of Tongue Twister and Learning Curve. Learning Curve sailed really well to also win on handicap ahead of Tongue Twister and Deep Throttle, while on PHRF the order was Deep Throttle from Learning Curve and Tongue Twister. B Division results had Vim coming home ahead of Chiara with the handicap results in the same order. A chance here to welcome back the Augusts from their extended overseas trip, however on the down side they found themselves having lost some of their winter sailing skills and were forced to withdraw when almost in sight of the finish.

The A Division general handicap series results went to Tongue Twister with 11 points, ahead of Learning Curve on 14 and Physical Favours on 18. In B Division it was Chiara finishing first with 13 points, ahead of a fast finishing Vim on 18 and Valentine (Blue Newport) on 24.

The PHRF results had Tongue Twister extend their lead slightly to finish on 8 points with Deep Throttle on 15 and Physical Favours on 18.

At the conclusion of the Divisional Championship it was down to the very last race to decide A Division's winner. In end it was Deep Throttle (finishing 3<sup>rd</sup> in the final race) to just squeak past Physical Favours (4<sup>th</sup> in the race), having these two exchange places in the final race of this twenty one race series. Deep Throttle finally took it out with 49 points from Physical Favours on 50 and Tongue Twister third on 82. Despite missing six races in the winter series the Augusts had amassed sufficient points earlier in the season to become B Division's Champion with 40 points from Valentine (50) and Stray Cat (Peter Hooper) on 87.

#### Fell Engineer winter rum race series

This close fought series, using the Mark Foy starting system which has gained increasing support throughout the winter, has now been completed.

Race 8 unfortunately had to be abandoned do to a lack of wind; even the dinghy fleet holding their regatta around the corner in Te Puna had to pull the plug early. Race 9 however saw the breeze back, though only just with a 5 to 8 knot easterly coming in just before the start. First boat home in this race was B Division's Mean Streak (Murray Williams) followed by A Division's Rikki (Cheryl Dair) and Cotton Blossom II (Doug France). It was quite a sight with them all beating back to the finish from the south western buoy, and with barely a minute separating these three at the finish.

So leading up to the final race in this series, and with the number of discards now being reduced from three to two because of the race 8 abandonment, A Division has Hicky Burr (Steve Miller) still hanging in there on 15 points from Demonstrator (Bob Donaldson) on 23 and Physical Favours on 26. Angstrom is hovering on 27 points and is helping to keep them honest. In B Division Vim on 20 points holds a slender one point lead over Mean Streak with Petty Cash (Frank de Vries) another two points back in third place.

Please note that the final race in this series will only use the VHF radio in case of an emergency. Yachts will NOT be warned prior to their thirty second warning signal, instead it will be up to crews racing to:

- **Confirm the official time** by checking the clock in the start box. 1.
- You will be handed a list of start times yours will be included. 2.
- 3. **Reconfirm the official time** during the race's five minute countdown beginning at 1355 hours,
- and again as other yachts start. Your start time will be preceded by a **thirty second warning** which will be signalled by the displaying of a red light plus two sound signals. **Start when the red light is turned off** and signalled by one sound signal. 4.
- 5.

The Winter series as mentioned in the last news letter got off to a slow start. Slow in the sense that the wind strength started at about I knot and never got over 4 knots till after we had finished racing. The course was set up the Te Puna as there was a fraction more wind there. A mixed fleet of 420s, 29ers, Lasers, and smaller numbers of other classes turned up with a very good turn out from Bay of Islands YC. Only one race was achieved and even that had to be shortened. However water and air temperatures were reasonable as shown by the amount of swimming by younger sailors. Two weeks later we had Winter series 2 with a similar selection of boats and similar numbers of sailors specially from B o I Y C. The wind was better [slightly] The fleet was taken up the Te Puna again with the KHS Squad using the Kerikeri River. Although there was no wind till nearly 12.00, A pleasant S E about 6 knots filled in and allowed 4 races to be sailed. See Separate results.

The last of the KCC Winter series is on Sunday 11<sup>th</sup>. Hope we have better wind though we can not complain about the temperature. The following weekend there is a BIC regatta hosted by the Club see much more detail elsewhere! A week later the KHS team is off to to Algie's Bay Warkworth to the Interdominion Team racing between 3 Open and 2 Girl's teams from Australia v the same arrangement from NZ. There is also a Girl's team from the Cook Is, to add spice to the competition. Kerikeri Open team are the current Champions and are working hard to try and defend their title. They come back to join the rest of the squad for a new season of team racing starting with the Spring regatta at Parua Bay, hopefully with 2 teams racing.

October sees the real beginning of the new season. As mentioned Learn To Sail classes startup at L. Manuwai on Saturday 8<sup>th</sup>. This will be a short introductory morning as the Radio Fleet has a major regatta that weekend and there is of course KCC Prize giving in the evening. The next weekend is very busy with our Coaching course on both Saturday and Sunday, and Squad Open day on Saturday, see separate notice. Monday afternoon sailing at the Lake restarts on Monday 10<sup>th</sup>. and as mentioned we also plan to try Thursday afternoon dinghy sailing at Doves Bay, starting on the 13<sup>th</sup>. This is possibly going to be run by a club coach with of course the help of other sailing adults as with the lake sailing. The aim is to help small boat sailors enjoy cruising and some informal racing from the club. Boats likely to be used are Mistrals, 420s, Splashes and hopefully Starlings, plus any other classes that owners may wish to bring. The plan is to extend the fun sailing we have on the lake out to sea.

There are plans to make more use of the sailing dinghy parking area south of the slipway to park many of these boats. If you are interested in joining in these CB cruising activities at Dove's Bay, contact, Melanie / Jo at the Marina office or Tony or Derry.

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# Rio trio hope to sail under the radar

It'll take more than a motorbike accident to keep Chris Sharp down.

Sharp hails from Kerikeri, a town where sailing and success go together like fish and chips, and is shaping to surprise at the upcoming Rio Paralympics. Sharp is bowman for New Zealand's three-man para-sailing team, and experience is looming to be a key characteristic for the group, something they're not short on.

The boat's mainsheet man, Richard Dodson, is 40, with the helm manned by Andrew May, who's 57. May is a fellow paraplegic, while Dodson has multiple sclerosis.

Sharp will turn 58 just a few days before the Paralympics begin on September 8, making him the oldest member of New Zealand's 29-strong contingent. Now based in Auckland, Sharp's whole life is dedicated to his sport, and this year's 15th Summer Paralympics will be his first. They come six years after he was left paralysed from the waist down when he crashed his motorbike into a tree.

"I'm sitting in a wheelchair as a result of having a very strong passion for motorbikes," he said. "The accident took me out of the frame for a couple of years and I've been recovering ever since. I'm still recovering now." Sharp's involvement in sailing started when he was 8, but he hadn't been in a boat since the accident.

That was until he met up with Dodson and the Kiwi Gold Sailing team. Paralympics New Zealand were then very keen to get him back into competitive sailing.

"I've always been a sailor, but I got into this when I was minding my own business and they chased me down," he said. "This seemed like it was too much for me a few years ago but I'm here. The sport now has become my whole life."

Sharp and his crew raced in last year's world championships in Melbourne. They finished as New Zealand's best-placed team. Their eighth-place finish among a fleet of 18 boats secured a berth in this year's Paralympics, where they'll compete in the three-person keelboat event (Sonar).

Dodson was part of New Zealand's successful America's Cup team in 1995 and 2000 and he's the former strategist for Team New Zealand.

New Zealand have never won a medal in para-sailing since the Paralympics began in 1968. "Our jobs are all quite unique and separate from each other," said Sharp. "We're an experienced team and we've got a fast boat. We're looking forward to the fact that people aren't going to pay a lot of attention to us. We can actually make an inroad into this competition before they realise what they're up against."

The first two Sonar races begin at 6am and 7.30am on Tuesday, September 13 (NZ time).


