PROTECTING YOUR INVESTMENT # 52 MODERN DIESEL FUEL SYSTEMS

Late in 2015 I responded to an emergency call from an overseas yacht which had suffered sudden engine stoppage in a bay in the Bay Of Islands. They had dropped anchor and were in no danger but were unable to sail the 30 ton deep draught yacht out of the bay with the wind right on the nose.

My expectations were that it would probably be something simple and easily rectified as the vessel was only a few years old with low hours on the meter.

How wrong I was. By the time I got to it, the batteries were fairly low due to their efforts to restart it, so I rafted up alongside, which was an exercise in itself, as the big yacht was steady in the half a meter chop and unplugged was bobbing up and down like a cork.. We managed to get my super long jumper leads across and tried to start the engine.

It spun over beautifully but made absolutely no attempt to fire up. Clearly it was a fuel problem, but what to do??

There was not one mechanical control connection to the engine, and the fuel pipe fed through an electric lift pump and disappeared into the bowels of the engine. Nothing of the fuel system was external on the engine. No injection pump, injector pipes, or injectors were visible. The entire engine was controlled electronically via a computer mounted on the engine.

After several hours of trying various tests as directed by the engine agents in Auckland, I finally had to admit defeat and my original diagnosis of no fuel at the injectors remained valid, but without the diagnostic programme computer available it was not possible to determine why.

I remained alongside and towed them clear of the bay until they could hoist sail and head for Opua.

The lesson I am preaching is that if you own a vessel with a modern "common rail" fuel system engine, I thoroughly advise you to talk to the agents and find whether or not you can obtain the appropriate diagnostic information to carry on the vessel. You may not be able to use it yourself in event of a breakdown, but at least it will provide someone else with the information necessary to carry out a realistic diagnostic procedure.



For the vessel in question, the fuel injection pump was not delivering the required pressure. The agents had assured me that if the pump could be heard running it was OK.

This totally threw me off the scent, as I COULD hear the pump running. The on-board computer apparently sensed the pressure drop and shut down the engine as if the key had been turned off: which is what it was supposed to do. I was later told by the owner that a very expensive complete replacement fuel pump was required to remedy the fault.

I hate to think what the outcome might have been if the failure had occurred up amongst the coral in the pacific islands...

Subsequent to this, I read up on the internet about common rail fuel systems. The consensus seemed to be, "extremely fuel efficient, but expensive to build and maintain". They are hyper sensitive to moisture content of fuels, so be warned if you are taking on fuel in out of the way places. Drums of fuel should ideally be left to stand for at least a week and pumped out without moving the drums. I'm sure such a practice is unworkable in most places, but that has always been the oil companies' recommendation.
